## **Dust for fingerprints**

#### What you need

- Flour or baby powder
- Teaspoon
- Make-up brush or paintbrush
- Clear tape
- Sheet of dark paper

#### **Instructions**

Found something suspicious and want to see if the culprit left their fingerprints behind? First, take a little scoop of flour or baby powder, and gently sprinkle it over the area to be tested. Blow any excess powder away. Once you've done that, carefully sweep away the powder using the make-up brush or paintbrush until the fingerprint is revealed. Place a piece of clear tape on top of the fingerprint and press it down. When you peel off the tape, you should have the fingerprint stuck to the sticky part. Finally, place the tape on to the dark paper. You've got the fingerprint - all you've got to do now is find who it belongs to. Good luck!
