### What you need

- A4 paper
- Ruler
- Pencil
- Colouring pencils
- Scissors



"Drawing all the monsters in *Unleash Your Creative Monster* got me thinking about an artist called Leonora Carrington. She liked to create weird and wonderful creatures in her work, which is perfect


for Halloween in a couple of weeks. She was a surrealist artist and her paintings are strange, dream-like scenes filled with monsters. (Surrealism is a type of art where things are deliberately very unusual.) A lot of the creatures she created are part-human, part-animal and part-ghost. If you look closely you can see traces of cow, bits of birds and glimpses of werewolf — all very weird.

"I thought it would be funny to make my own Leonora Carrington-inspired mix-and-match monster-maker. With this one, the more you draw, the more combinations you'll be able to make. Get inspired by looking at actual animals, and fantasy creatures such as dragons and demons."

Draw two lines across your sheet of paper, 10 centimetres from the top and bottom.



Mark four points – two on each line, seven centimetres in from both sides.



Draw a creature – make sure the neck and waist pass through the four marked points.



Colour in your monster and carefully cut along the lines.



Repeat steps 1 to 4 to make more weird and wonderful monsters.
