



Carefully pick your vocabulary

All English teachers will tell you the same: word choices, in your writing and speaking, are incredibly important.





2 Extend your sentences

Conjunctions such as "however" and "in addition" are great ways of extending your ideas and showing critical

thinking skills. Adding clauses to your sentences can add detail, ideas, self-reflection, alternative perspectives, and a range of other things that will make you sound super smart.

Listen!

Nothing will make you sound less smart than not actually listening to the person you are talking to. Don't just patiently wait for your turn to talk, listen

to what other people are saying and try to understand the point they are making.

research the topic you are


talking or writing about.
