Firstly, print or cut out a picture of a room, or draw one you like.



Gather your printed materals and select pictures you'd like to include in your room.



Cut them out (think about your colour scheme - I kept mine mainly black, white and red).



Choose a central figure for your picture and cut it out neatly.



Now decide what goes where. Experiment with compositions to see what looks best.



When you're happy with your arrangement, stick it down. Your Pop Art collage is complete.
