What is a "blog"?

A blog is a collection of written pieces of a blogger's opinion and knowledge on different topics that is shared



online for people to read. Its layout is quite like diary entries, in that the most recent post is at the top, with a date and topped with a catchy title. Most blogs are written to appeal to a specific audience.



What will you write about?

This is a big decision because it will shape what you write about in each entry. You can pick something specific, such

as Roald Dahl books and news, or something broader and more varied, such as the best parks and playgrounds in the UK.

Learn from others

Reading other blogs is a great way for you to find out about blogs and help you choose what you'll write about.




Ask an adult to help you find suitable blogs to follow. You might already follow vloggers (video bloggers) on YouTube or book bloggers on other internet platforms.
