## How to write an awesome ending

This week we look at how to end a story, which can be a lot harder than starting one. Great writing isn't just about well-written sentences, it is also how a story is put together – what's known as structure. Here are Holly's ideas for how to use your structure to make sure your stories finish with a bang.

**Foreshadowing** Foreshadowing is a way of preparing your reader for a great ending. It means giving them clues throughout the story to keep them interested in



what will happen later. For example, stormy weather could be a sign that something bad or dramatic is going to happen. You can draw attention to an object or something about your character in order to leave a hint. For example, if they dream about finding a gold coin, it could be a sign that they will become rich.



## Happily ever after

This is most people's favourite way to end a story. With a happy ending, all the loose ends are resolved, questions are


answered and characters get all the good things they deserve. They might make up with their friends, find the missing treasure or overcome a bully or difficult time. Readers are left feeling satisfied when they finish a book with this kind of ending.

The cliffhanger A cliffhanger ending is very popular when you can't think of how to finish your story. It often involves the storyline ending abruptly and the reader is



left thinking, "Goodness me, what will happen next?" It is important to remember this type of ending can also leave your reader feeling frustrated that so much was left unexplained. However, it's a good way to set up a sequel (follow-on story).






Once upon a time

Surprise! Sometimes a big twist in the story, particularly at the end, can make your writing shine. An unexpected surprise can give the reader a big



"wow!" moment. Maybe a secret is uncovered, a character is revealed as an entirely different person or the story goes in a different direction – it could suddenly become a ghost story. However you do it, the aim is to thrill your reader and make them say, "I was not expecting that ending!"
